TOMMY WYCHE LAND CONSERVATION CHAMPION

Glenn Hilliard is being honored for his tireless advocacy for trails, green spaces, and natural places in the Upstate, for his determined quest for excellence in conservation outcomes, and for his leadership in the Saluda Grade Trail initiative.

In 1974, Mr. Hilliard founded the Foothills Trail Conference (now the Foothills Trail Conservancy) and worked tirelessly to negotiate, route and develop the now 77-mile — 110 miles including spur trails — Foothills Trail through Upstate South Carolina and Western North. Thousands of hikers and backpackers now travel the Foothills Trail each year, enjoying the rich and diverse vistas offered. *Backpacker Magazine* has twice named it one of the best 50+ mile trails in the country.

Recently, Mr. Hilliard has been instrumental in efforts to transform the inactive Saluda Grade rail line into a vibrant, 31-mile multi-use trail corridor connecting Upstate South Carolina and Western North Carolina. Under his leadership, the Saluda Grade Trail Conservancy and coalition of nonprofit partners have reached an agreement with Norfolk Southern to sell the 31-mile rail line for use as a recreational trail.

Named after visionary conservationist Tommy Wyche, this award recognizes a business, organization, or individual who has made a significant contribution to the protection of farmlands, forest lands, natural areas, and other special places in the Upstate.



Benjamin I. Duncan, II

CLEAN WATER CHAMPION

Ben Duncan, South Carolina Chief Resilience Officer, is being honored for his determined advocacy at the state level for enhanced water quality and smart approaches to resource protection.

In 2021, Governor Henry McMaster appointed Mr. Duncan as South Carolina's first-ever Chief Resilience Officer. Ben previously served as Program Management Director with South Carolina Disaster Recovery Office. He also served as Deputy Program Management Director and Director of Support for the Disaster Recovery Office.

Mr. Duncan and his team at the South Carolina Office of Resilience have been tasked with preparing the state for extreme weather events from the coast to the piedmont. Through the development and implementation of a Strategic Statewide Resilience and Risk Reduction Plan, the Office is working to identify major flood risks, potential impacts, and strategies for local governments to enact in order to build more resilient communities. South Carolina is one of only four states in the country with a dedicated state resilience office.

In total, Ben's career in public service spans 35 years.

The Clean Water Champion Award recognizes a business, organization, governmental entity, or individual who has made a significant contribution to water quality improvement or water resources management in the Upstate.



The Honorable Chandra E. Dillard

PUBLIC SERVANT OF THE YEAR

Chandra Dillard is being recognized for her consistent voice in support of important land and water protection issues, sustainable community development, and affordable housing in the Upstate and statewide.

Representative Chandra Dillard began her public service in 1999 as a member of Greenville City Council representing District 3, making her the first woman to serve the District. After a distinguished service record of nine years on City Council, Councilman Dillard ran for and was elected to the South Carolina House of Representatives in 2008 representing State House District 23. In the House, she serves on the House Ways and Means Committee and was the first female to hold the Chairman position on the Environmental Subcommittee of the Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee and Labor, Commerce and Industry Committee.

Chandra is a hands-on advocate for her constituents who believes in the spirit of collaboration to solve community and state challenges. Over the course of her 24-year career in public service, she has helped to secure more than \$100 million to address human development, community development, conservation, and infrastructure needs.

The Public Servant of the Year Award recognizes an individual who holds elected or appointed office (local, state or federal) or works for a governmental agency (local, state or federal) in the Upstate and has made significant contributions in one or more of the following fields: land conservation, clean air, clean water, and sustainable development.

BRAD WYCHE EXTRAORDINARY ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Dr. Joab "Joe" M. Lesesne is being honored for a lifetime of dedicated service to the natural world; for his conservation efforts in the Upstate and beyond; for his dedicated service to Upstate Forever as an advocate, board member and board chair; and for his leadership throughout the state as a voice for common-sense approaches to land and water conservation.

Joe Lesesne graduated from Erskine College and earned his master's degree and Ph.D. from the University of South Carolina. He served as president of Wofford College for 28 years (1972-2000). During his tenure, the campus doubled in size, the number of majors increased from 15 to 23, and the college's endowment grew from \$3.5 million to over \$100 million.

Dr. Lesesne has served as chairman of the boards of the Spartanburg Area Chamber of Commerce, the Spartanburg County Foundation, and the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources. His many honors include the Neville Holcombe Distinguished Citizenship Award, the Spartanburg Area Chamber of Commerce (1992); the Daniel Morgan Award, United Way of the Piedmont (1997); the Sergeant William Jasper Award, South Carolina State Chamber of Commerce (1995); and the Order of the Palmetto (2000). He is also a brigadier general and brigade commander of the South Carolina Army National Guard, now holding the rank of major general, retired.

Named in honor of Upstate Forever Founder Brad Wyche, this award recognizes an exceptional individual whose achievements over a number of decades have made significant, sustained impacts on conservation efforts in Upstate South Carolina.



HOST OF LUNCHEON

Carol Clarke

Carol is a native of Michigan's Upper Peninsula, and got her degree in Mass Communications from Northern Michigan University at Marquette. She also spent part of her senior year at Richmond College in England, studying British Mass Media.

Carol worked as an anchor/reporter in Marquette, Michigan and Rochester, New York. A brush with frostbite in Rochester made her realize living in a warmer climate might suit her better after all, and she happily accepted an anchor job at WYFF News 4 in 1985.

Carol has won a number of awards, including a 2009 Peabody award for her work on "Chronicle: Paul's Gift." She's also won several Emmys, three National Headliner Awards, and the Champion-Tuck Economics Prize for Business Reporting for a series she did on the textile industry in Taiwan and Hong Kong. She's been inducted into the NATAS Silver Circle. In 2007, the South Carolina Broadcaster's Association awarded her one of its highest honors, the Masters Award. Carol shares the news desk with her co-anchor Nigel Robertson each weeknight and continues to report on health and medical issues through her popular feature "4 Your Health."



SPEAKER Mark Taylor

A registered professional geologist, Mark is the retired CEO of Synterra, an environmental consulting firm in Greenville. He holds a bachelor's degree in geology from Harvard University and a master's degree in geology from the University of Michigan.

Mark was among the first members of Upstate Forever's Board of Directors in 1998, and continued to serve on UF's Board, including in the Chair role in 2017-2018.

Mr. Taylor's decades-long commitment to conservation led him to permanently protect the 26-acre property he owns in Pickens County through a conservation easement in 2022. The protection of the Eastatoe Headwaters tract will make a significant contribution to clean water, agriculture, wildlife habitat, and natural beauty in this critical region of the Upstate.

SPEAKER Wes Cooler

Wes Cooler grew up in the mountains of Pickens County. After a 23-year career as an Army officer, he returned to live again in northern Pickens County.

Since his return, he has served for 4 years on the Pickens County Planning Commission where he was instrumental in writing the County's Development Standards Ordinance and the County's first Comprehensive Plan. He represented the SC Wildlife Federation on Duke Energy's Keowee-Toxaway Relicensing Stakeholders Team, where he helped craft significant conservation outcomes from that process and he currently represents Naturaland Trust on Duke Energy's Bad Creek Relicensing Stakeholders Team.

Wes served as Land Trust Chair while on the board of Upstate Forever. Through his continuing service on the board of Naturaland Trust and the Upstate Forever Advisory Board, he has remained active with Upstate Forever and land conservation efforts in the Upstate.
